January 13: The Star Quilt by Nancy E. Turner

This sequel to These Is My Words continues the story of Sarah's struggles to make a home in the 1906 Arizona Territory.

February 10: The Girl You Left Behind by JoJo Moyes

A sweeping story of love and loss, deftly weaving two journeys from World War I France to present day London.

March 9: Dragon's Teeth 1 by Upton Sinclair

In this 1943 Pulitzer Prize winner, Sinclair takes you from the Wall Street Crash of 1929 to the Nazi Blood Purge of 1934.

April 13: Shadowbrook by Beverly Swerling

Peopled with unforgettable characters and historical figures, this novel captures the conflict that led to American independence.

May 11: Secrets of a Charmed Life by Susan Meissner

An interview between Kenrda, a young student, and Isabel, an elderly survivor of WWII, reveals long-kept secrets about the past.

June 8: A Star for Mrs. Blake by April Smith

This book captures a real moment in American history, imagining the experiences of five women who travel to France to visit the graves of their sons, fallen WWI soldiers.

July 13: Flight of Dreams by Ariel Lawhon

This book is a fiercely intimate portrait of the real people on board the last flight of the Hindenburg.

August 10: At the Edge of Summer by Jessica Brockmole

A wounded veteran and an artist who creates facial prostheses. Circumstances reunite two people who once shared a deep relationship in this epistolary novel.

January 9: Little Fires Everywhere by Celeste Ng

The carefully order suburb of Shaker Heights is shaken when a woman with a mysterious past and disregard for the rules arrives.

February 13: The Lilac Girls by Martha Hall Kelly

Based on a true story of a New York socialite who championed a group of concentration camp survivors known as the Rabbits.

March 12: The Perfect Stranger by Megan Miranda

Everyone in this rural Pennsylvania town has something to hide. How do you uncover the truth when you are busy hiding your own?

April 9: The Invention of Wings by Sue Monk Kidd

Inspired by the life of abolitionist and early advocate for women's rights Sarah Grimke, this book follows the intertwined lives of Sarah and Hetty, a young woman enslaved to the Grimke family.

May 14: The Last Anniversary by Liane Moriarty

Sophie encounters an old mystery, falls in love, meets old friends and makes new in a novel full of sharp wit and lovably eccentric characters.

June 11: The Nickel Boys by Colson Whitehead

This devastating narrative is based on a real reform school that operated for 111 years, warping the lives of thousands of children.

July 9: The Late Homecomer by Kao Kalia Yang

Through the her family's story, Yang gives voice to experiences of many Hmong immigrants to the U.S. in the era following the Vietnam War.

August 13: Thunderstruck by Erik Larson

The lives of Hawley Crippen, an unlikely murderer, and Guglielmo Marconi, the obsessive creator of the wireless radio, intersect during one of the greatest criminal chases of all time.
